

The Midwest: People, Places, and Culture

States in the Midwest

There are 12 states in the Midwest Region of the United States.

They are:

ILLINOIS -- The state with the 3rd largest city in the USA: Chicago

INDIANA -- Home of the largest sports arena in the world, the Indianapolis Motor

Speedway

IOWA -- The state that produces the most corn in the USA

KANSAS -- The state that produces the most wheat in the USA

MICHIGAN -- The state that produces the most cars in the USA

MINNESOTA -- Known as the "Land of 10,000 lakes," it actually has 11, 842 lakes

MISSOURI -- Home of the world's largest arch, the St. Louis Arch

NEBRASKA -- The state with the largest number of miles of rivers

NORTH DAKOTA -- The state with the most national wildlife refuges (62)

SOUTH DAKOTA -- Home to Mount Rushmore (the giant rock with presidents faces)

OHIO -- New menu items for fast food chains like McDonalds, Wendy's and Chipotle

are released here before the rest of the country

WISCONSIN -- The state the produces the most cheese in the USA




Weather and Natural Disasters

The Midwest is the windiest region in the United States. In fact, Chicago, Illinois is known as "The Windy City."

The areas of the Midwest that are close to the Great Lakes get a ton of snow. This is known as Lake Effect Snow.

In the past few years, the Midwest has experienced more flooding than usual, likely because of climate change.

The infamous Tornado Alley spans several Midwestern States, including Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, and South Dakota. Other Midwestern States also have more tornadoes than the rest of the US. Watch these tornadoes spin!

Resources and Industry in the Midwest



The Midwest has many natural resources, including soil, coal, oil, iron ore, limestone, lumber, wind, and natural gas.

Manufacturing in the Midwest


The Midwest manufactures many products that we use on a daily basis. The most common products manufactured in the Midwest are:

Food products, especially ones that are made from corn and wheat.

Heavy Machinery

Appliances (like refrigerators and ovens)

Cars -- Look at this car being assembled in a BMW factory! All of the iron ore used to build the car and the resources needed to run the factory can be mined right in the Midwest!

Important People and Cultures in the Midwest





Many important historical figures are from the Midwest.

NEIL ARMSTRONG, the first man to walk on the moon, was from Ohio PRESIDENT ABRAHAM LINCOLN spent most of his life in Indiana and Illinois. In fact, 15 of our Presidents were from the Midwest!

THOMAS EDISON, a famous inventor who invented the lightbulb, was from Ohio







African Americans in the Midwest

About 50 years after the end of slavery and the Civil War, between the years 1917 and 1970s, African American people began a "Great Migration" from the South to the cities of the Midwest.

The Great Migration happened because African Americans wanted an end to the racial segregation they faced, and there were many jobs available in the factories in the Midwest. Without the contributions of African American workers, manufacturing in the Midwest would not have made such a big impact on American life.



Native Americans in the Midwest

There are many Native American tribes that have lived in the Midwest region for thousands of years. The largest tribes in the Midwest include the Blackfeet, Sioux, and Chippewa tribes.

The Blackfeet Tribe were a nomadic people, which means they did not have a home, but moved around all the time. They followed bison across the plains.

The Sioux consider Mt. Rushmore to be sacred land and were very upset when the Mt. Rushmore National Memorial was built.

The Chippewa tribe were known as excellent hunters and fishermen.
